# YEAR IN REVIEW

## 2024

It's been a gratifying first year serving as the GCSECA Board President. I was honored and humbled to take over the reins from Jeff Larson in January after the conclusion of his very capable tenure of serving in this role for eight years. A lot has happened since then, and I wanted to share some of the highlights.

We kicked off the year with our Annual Meeting and Legislative Conference. The membership elected other officers at that time, with Bill Arendell continuing as Vice President, Joe Anderson being elected Treasurer and Jeff Larson, Secretary. Jeff retired from the GCSECA Board in October. Brian Heithoff was elected at the November Board Meeting to fill the remaining term of the Secretary position.

Even though we had a change in Board leadership, we didn't miss a beat. 2024 saw a renewed focus on development, education and training programs for our members. We initiated our first ever Board Leadership event and plan to build on that effort in coming years. We also created our inaugural Communications Conference and look forward to continuing that in future years. We added a number of new training and professional development opportunities and look forward to bringing even more in 2025 and beyond.

GCSECA was busy at the State Legislature. We were able to head off some problematic bills that would have negatively impacted our operations and encroached on our self-governance model. Meanwhile, the GCSECA Team successfully championed the passage of bills that will alleviate delays associated with building electric infrastructure and create more efficiency in records reporting for co-op staffs. At the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC), GCSECA realized a long-fought policy win. The ACC approved a measure that excludes co-ops from all dockets that are opened – except if a commissioner wishes to apply a docket to the co-ops. Being relieved from these “generic dockets” will free up a tremendous amount of co-op staff time.

In Washington, D.C. and in Phoenix, we assisted with our members' efforts to participate in the New ERA, PACE and Grid Resiliency grant funds made available to co-ops through the Inflation Reduction Act. Nearly \$1 billion of grant funds will flow to Arizona co-ops that will help to build reliable, affordable and sustainable generation projects and help to “harden” the electric grid and hopefully prevent damage from wildfires.

Our Summer Meeting in Flagstaff seems to get bigger and better each year. 2024 was no exception – with record attendance and a full slate of activities that were enjoyed by all. The Washington Youth Tour continued to be a highlight of the year, with 50 Arizona high schoolers enjoying D.C. and learning about the important issues facing our country. We also embarked on a new communications endeavor – CommUnity Energy – to continue to advocate for the best interests of our members.

As you can see, it's been a very busy and rewarding year for Arizona's electric co-ops. I look forward to seeing what's in store for 2025 and know that we will continue to be successful by working together, as has been our hallmark in Arizona.

Sometimes I feel like I'm in a car driving 100 miles per hour as the fenceposts and dotted lines in the middle of the road zip by. Realizing that 2024 is fading – already! – brings that sensation.

It's January. Our Annual Winter Meeting and Legislative Conference is in full swing. We all anticipate a busy year and we're teeing up bills in the Arizona Legislature that will quicken the docile pace of getting approvals for needed projects. Our consistent engagement with the Arizona Corporation Commission trundles on. Co-op CEOs from around the country descend on Scottsdale, and we're apologizing for the record cold temperatures that bring snow to the fringes of the Valley.



Suddenly it's March and it's time for the year's first Annual Meeting -- in Pima with the Graham County Electric Cooperative. On my way back to Tempe, I chauffeur the elderly statesman of Arizona's co-ops to a relative's house in Mesa. I hear stories I've heard before, and some new ones. I'll always cherish that ride, as several months later, Gene Robert Larson ends his remarkable time amongst us. Meantime, our bills at the legislature are moving through the process and look promising, as do a couple of initiatives at the ACC. I make my first celebratory trip to Marana, where Trico EC has been awarded a PACE grant and the Undersecretary for the U.S. Rural Development Department arrives to commemorate the occasion.

April heralds the beginning of spring and warmer weather – along with the inaugural Directors Conference and Communicators Conference – both among our efforts to provide more value for our members. We also lead a delegation to Washington, D.C. to meet with Congressional offices to press our case for matters that affect Arizona's co-ops. At the Arizona Legislature, two of our bills pass and are signed into law. In May, the ACC grants co-ops long-sought relief from participation in "generic dockets."

The summer months are filled with activities, both old and new. I journey to the Navajo Reservation and meet a line crew from Trico and a reporter, photographer and producer from CNN, who do a piece on the Light Up Navajo project, featuring Arizona Lineworkers! Sulphur Springs Valley also sends a crew to a different part of the reservation. Our Summer Meeting in Flagstaff continues to grow, and we meet the challenge of rearranging meeting space to accommodate the record crowd.

As fall arrives, the number of new professional development opportunities we began offering this year proliferate. Numerous Member ad hoc committees have been formed and are working collaboratively in areas such as finance, human resources, IT and safety. We celebrate the announcement of AzG&T receipt of more than \$600 million of PACE and New ERA grants, which will enable massive increases in solar and battery electric power generation. U.S. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack traveled to Marana to make the announcement. We assist with a successful Linemen's Rodeo and coordinate the second annual "public power" meeting in our efforts to align community-owned power interests in Arizona. In that vein, GCSECA kicks off the CommUnity Energy communications campaign, "to enshrine the value of cooperative and community-owned power."

November's elections usher upcoming changes to the political landscape. Arizona's co-ops have much opportunity, but also face the usual uncertainty of political fickleness.

And whoosh, here we are at year's end. It seems as though we just revved up the engine in January, and we've already arrived at our destination. But it's really a brief rest stop, rather than a destination. Soon enough, we will put the accelerator to the floor and whirl into 2025.

## 2024 Federal Relations and Regulatory Services

Congressional gridlock, Executive Orders and Directives, agency Rules and Regulations dominated the 118th Congress. With a divided federal government, legislative action created an impasse and

ushered in procedural gamesmanship leaving the Biden Administration to unleash the powers of the executive agencies to promulgate rules to accomplish the administration's agenda. Agencies also worked to disperse over a trillion dollars in funding appropriated through the Infrastructure, Investment and Jobs Act and the Inflation Reduction Act signed into law in 2022 when Democrats enjoyed a government trifecta.

## Federal Relations Update

Outside of "must-pass" legislation like Federal Government Funding, Supplemental Disaster Relief and the annual National Defense Authorization Act – which funds the Department of Defense – lawmakers had little appetite to collaborate on traditionally bipartisan bills like the Farm Bill. One measure that received across the aisle bipartisan support was the Fix Our Forests Act passing the House on a 268-151 vote. The bill expedites vegetation management and grid hardening approvals, reduces

frivolous litigation and restores forest health and protect vulnerable communities wildfire risks. GCSECA worked with a western RESMA Working Group and the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) on policy actions to identify best practices that reduce the risk of devastating wildfires.



The issue was also addressed through NRECA's Resolutions process. Three amendments to existing member resolutions were drafted by the Working Group. Specifically, the amendments direct NRECA to seek legislative and regulatory policies that:

- support initiatives that reduce wildfire risks to electric co-ops.
- streamline the NEPA review process and seek categorical exclusions for cooperative work on federal lands and limit strict liability requirements
- help develop education programs and tools to communicate the risks of wildfires.
- help co-ops secure federal grants for system hardening and other preventive measures.

## REST and EE/DSM Waiver Requests / Rule Repeals

GCSECA proposal to assist its distribution cooperative members obtain waivers for certain filing requirements under the Commission's REST and EE/DSM rules.

## Generic Docket Proposal

A strategic planning goal set by GCSECA's Board was to create a presumption that generic dockets do not apply to the cooperatives. The ACC opened a proliferation of dockets to investigate issues not pertinent to Cooperatives so-called "generic" dockets. These dockets unintentionally created administrative burdens and require a tremendous amount of time and resources for the Cooperatives and ACC staff to react.

- In May 2024 (Decision No. 79364), the Commission approved GCSECA's request for an order endorsing the presumption.





# CONGRESSMAN JUAN CISCOMANI Receives the 2024 Cooperative Champion Award

Congressman Juan Ciscomani was named GCSECA’s 2024 Arizona Rural Electric Co-op Champion in recognition for his many accomplishments and efforts to advocate on behalf of our member Co-ops and the communities they serve.

In 2022, Juan was elected to represent Arizona’s 6th congressional district, becoming the first naturalized American citizen from Mexico elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in Arizona history. In 2024, Juan was named the most bipartisan U.S. House of Representatives member from Arizona by the Lugar Center and McCourt School of Public Policy at Georgetown University.

Rep. Ciscomani represents a district which includes the Cooperative territories for Duncan Valley Electric, Graham County Electric, Navopache Electric, Sulphur Springs Valley Electric, Trico Electric, AzG&T headquarters and the Apache Generating Station. "We are pleased to recognize Congressman Ciscomani for his continued support of Arizona's rural electric co-ops across the district," said Patrick Ledger, CEO of AzG&T and chair of GCSECA's Legislative and Government Relations Committee. The congressman has proven to be a critical Cooperative ally and has demonstrated tremendous concern for our rural members."

**"I am honored to be the recipient of the Co-op Champion award," said Rep. Ciscomani. "Arizona's rural electric Cooperatives are the backbone and livelihood of the rural communities across my district. They provide critical services which enable rural Arizonans to live, learn, and achieve their American Dream."**

Earlier this year, the U.S. House of Representatives passed a package that included \$26 million in projects for Southern Arizona. Some of the projects requested by Rep. Ciscomani and approved include:

- \$2 million for the town of Pima volunteer fire station.
- \$1.3 million for the Graham County Gila River Linear Park and Trail Project.
- \$274,000 for the town of Duncan and Hunter Estates Drainage Mitigation and Design.
- \$3,792,927 for the City of Sierra Vista for the Buffalo Soldier Trail.
- \$859,000 for Northern Cochise County Community Hospital in Willcox.

## 2024 Legislative Session Was a Mixture of Offense & Defense



The state’s line siting statutes were further reformed when Governor Hobbs signed HB2003 (sponsored by Rep. Gail Griffin), a bill that allows for utilities to replace conductors, wires and poles on existing transmission lines without needing to secure a new Certificate of Environmental Compatibility from the Line Siting Committee. Prior to signing, the bill passed in bipartisan fashion with a 43-15 vote in the House and then passed in the Senate with an 18-9 vote.

Beyond line siting bills, GCSECA also worked to defeat SB1637 (sponsored by Sen. Frank Carroll), a bill that would have precluded co-ops from owning EV charging stations. GCSECA and others encouraged senators to fully consider the bill before floor consideration. A number of rural Republican Senators expressed reservations about the bill, should it receive a floor vote. The concerns assured that the bill would not gain enough votes to pass, so it did not move forward.

### BUDGET

Gov. Hobbs signed a \$16.1 billion budget for the next fiscal year, but there weren’t too many legislators happy about it. The budget represents about \$1.9 billion in cuts from the current budget, of which approximately half of the savings were derived from funding sweeps and the other half from cuts.



For rural Arizona, some of the key inputs of the budget included the total appropriation authority for the ACC being dropped by \$1.2 million and the Legislature approving a funding sweep of \$2.1 million from the Utility Regulation Revolving Fund (URRF). Additionally, the deposit being made to the Arizona Commerce Authority’s rural broadband accelerated match fund was reduced by \$23.6 million, and the Water Infrastructure Financing Authority (WIFA) was swept to the tune of \$59.7 million and its long-term water augmentation fund lost \$97.3 million. Finally, the last \$333 million deposit that was set to be given to WIFA next year was also eliminated.

### ELECTION

Due to the overwhelming early ballot advantage – as well the Election Day turnout advantage – Republicans not only kept control of the Senate but expanded their majority. The GOP was able to garner 17 seats in the Senate (out of 30) – expanding their majority by one. In the House, the results followed a similar path with Republicans expanding their majority by two seats. This will allow them to go into the next Legislature with 33 seats (out of 60).



GCSECA spent \$30,000 as part of an Independent Expenditure to support Sen. Shawna Bolick, Rep. Justin Wilmeth and Ari Bradshaw in hyper-competitive LD2 (North Phoenix). Both Senator Bolick and Rep. Wilmeth won re-election.



The Director of Communications provides several services for the statewide designed to assist the member organizations in their communications, public relations and various initiative/campaign materials, as needed. In 2024, GCSECA maintained a steady pace and continued to strive towards excellence. Outlined below are the successes from 2024:

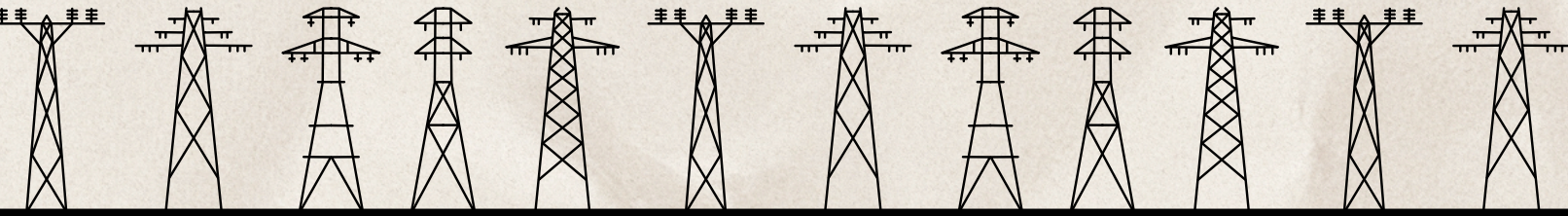
- Continued the timely development and distribution of GCSECA's monthly editions of the electronic newsletter, Current Activities.
- Successfully transitioned to and executed a bi-monthly schedule for the publication of the GCSECA Currents magazine in partnership with Pioneer Utility Resources (PUR), which is directed toward key leaders within the electric utility industry.
- Executed publications and graphic design for the 2024 GCSECA Summer Meeting and 24th Annual Miles Oldfather Golf Tournament at the Little America Hotel in Flagstaff, AZ.
- Coordinated, planned and assisted with the 2024 Annual Winter Meeting & Legislative Conference and publications.
- Managed and created the GCSECA 2025 printed directory of member systems and affiliate organizations.
- Planned & organized 2024 Washington Youth Tour with 61 total participants - both students and chaperones.
- Served as staff liaison to the Member & Public Relations Committee.
- Continued content planning and coordination with PUR to increase the engagement, frequency and quality of content posted to GCSECA social media pages and sites.
- Presented to and increased networking relations with the communications staff at NRECA and other statewide communicators to further highlight Arizona's co-op success.
- Published and coordinated the content, design and printing of GCSECA's Annual Report and ACRE Annual Report.
- Successfully analyzed, developed and launched the CommUnity Energy state-wide communications initiative, which will run through 2025.
- Analyzed and created a new 2025 Communications Plan which highlights key improvement areas found in the National Survey on the Cooperative Difference.
- Fortified and assisted in deepening connections and relationships with Allied public-power organizations



The 2024 calendar year proved to be both busy and productive for both Member Engagement and Professional Development. Working in tandem, Member Engagement and Professional Development have provided a great deal of program growth and with that, the strive to meet the needs of GCSECA members.

The Member Engagement and Professional Development Specialist provides several services for the statewide. These services are designed to benefit the member organizations with their education, professional development and engagement needs. The last year was filled with many successful moments and accomplishments. Outlined below are the achievements from 2024:

- Made in-person visits to all co-ops and associate members. Focused meetings with members of the Education Committee, CEO/General Managers, Executive Assistants and other key personnel.
- Worked closely with Hannah Capozzi, Communications Director to help execute the 2024 Annual/Winter Meeting at the DoubleTree in Tempe, AZ.
- At the request of the Board, scouted numerous venue sites for a new Annual/Winter Meeting option. Contracted with The Tempe Mission Palms and secured this venue for the 2025 Annual/Winter Meeting.
- Planned, coordinated, and assisted in the 2024 GCSECA Summer Meeting and 24th Annual Miles Oldfather Golf Tournament at the Little America Hotel in Flagstaff, AZ.
- Secured numerous sponsorships for both the 2024 Annual Winter Meeting and the 2024 Summer Meeting, resulting in revenue of more than \$80,000 in combined sponsored funds.
- Assisted in the implementation of the new Learning Management System, Absorb. Actively the System Administrator and the main point of contact for onboarding and contract negotiations.
- In coordination with Hannah Capozzi, planned Washington Youth Tour. Attended delegate and chaperone orientations at participating co-ops and utilities.
- In June, successfully executed the Washington Youth Tour trip as the lead director.



- Served as staff liaison for the Education and Professional Development Committee and the Group Purchasing Committee.
- Coordinated locations and/or hosted quarterly meetings for the Education and Professional Development Committee. Worked closely with the chair on the agenda and minutes.
- Helped facilitate meeting place for the Group Purchasing Committee and worked closely with the chair on agenda and vendor presentations.
- Facilitated the creation of the Lineman's Rodeo Ad-Hoc Committee. Assisted with meeting logistics, answering questions and served as an overall resource.
- Coordinated and implemented two Board Leadership, Supervisor and Management Development Program (SMDP) classes.
- Coordinated, created and implemented a Director's Training Workshop in conjunction with CFC.
- Worked with the Human Resources Ad-Hoc Committee to provide a meeting space and training. Facilitated and implemented a Human Resource Training Conference which was held in the spring of 2024.
- Worked with the Safety Ad-Hoc Committee to help provide for any meeting needs and answered questions regarding the statewide safety involvement.
- In conjunction with Sulfur Springs Valley Electric Cooperative, sent a Safety Needs assessment and analyzed results to later be used to assess the statewide's safety involvement.
- Facilitated the creation of a Finance and Accounting Ad-Hoc Committee.
- Facilitated and implemented a Spring and Fall Finance and Accounting Training Workshop in coordination with Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert & Moss, LLP.
- Sent numerous professional development surveys to help establish the 2025 Professional Development Schedule.

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# GCSECA Hosts Winter & Summer Meetings

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Each year, GCSECA hosts two meetings which highlight cooperation among cooperatives, democratic member control, education, training and information as well as concern for our communities. This year, GCSECA continued with tradition in hosting the Winter Meeting & Legislative Conference in Tempe and the Summer Meeting in Flagstaff.

GCSECA's Winter Meeting and Legislative Conference honored the 'passing of the gavel' with the seating of a new board president. Former GCSECA Board President Jeff Larson from Graham County Electric Cooperative (GCEC) was honored for his service during the general session, while new GCSECA Board President Chuck Moore from Navopache Electric Cooperative (NEC) led the general session. GCSECA also recognized Curtis Nolan from Sulphur Springs Valley Electric Cooperative (SSVEC) for his dedicated 22 years of service as Arizona's Board Representative on the NRECA Board of Directors, as Mohave Electric Cooperative CEO Tyler Carlson was seated as the new Board Representative at NRECA's PowerXchange annual meeting in March.



GCSECA's Summer Meeting broke records in terms of attendees, sponsorships and auction proceeds. Activities included the Board Presidents Lunch, a hotly contested golf tournament, the GCSECA Board of Directors July Meeting, a reception that benefitted AzACRE and a general session featuring a parade of outstanding speakers. NRECA Board President Tony Anderson, Mike Noble, CEO of Noble Predictive Insights, and four of the six candidates vying for seats on the Arizona Corporation Commission were among the notable speakers. GCSECA also recognized Congressman Juan Ciscomani with its 2024 Co-Op Champion Award. The Summer Meeting concluded with a sold-out Board Leadership Course and a Group Purchasing Committee meeting.

50 students and 11 chaperones from Arizona's electric co-ops and tribal utilities attended the 2024 Youth Tour, as well as Sylvia Cruz, GCSECA's Arizona Youth Tour Co-Director and Member Engagement and Professional Development Specialist. Students and chaperones alike experienced a full schedule of events and experiences while in D.C., setting a tone of hope and adventure.

2024 was also the first year in almost a decade that all Youth Tour participants were together in one hotel for the entire duration of the Tour. The Gaylord National Harbor hosted all 1,800 students and chaperones for the 2024 Youth Tour, creating a unique camaraderie and an atmosphere of anticipation, excitement and empowerment for all who attended.

Among the fast-paced fun and adventure, students learn about electric co-op structure and history, meet with their elected officials face-to-face and learn about U.S. history. Students also have a night specifically dedicated to joining with every other participating state under the coordination of NRECA. NRECA staff leads the charge of a night filled with laughter, fun and education. Students hear from past Youth Tour alumni, lineworkers who have participated in NRECA's International Program, NRECA employees and the ever-favorite inspirational speaker, Mike Schlappi.

Youth Tour ignites a passion within delegates to look at the world with a fresh perspective, challenge the status quo, invest in rural America and create change in their communities.
