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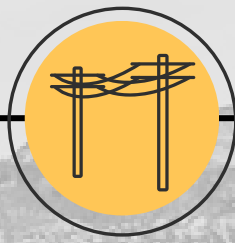

2022 A YEAR IN REVIEW

"AS I REFLECT ON THIS PAST YEAR, I AM FILLED WITH GRATITUDE FOR THE MANY THINGS OUR ORGANIZATION HAS ACCOMPLISHED."

During 2022, we saw the return of mostly “normal” routines in our daily lives and at GCSECA. At our statewide, however, “normal” doesn’t mean steady as you go. “Normal” is reacting to challenges Arizona’s co-ops face and providing solutions to strengthen our Members. I’m very happy to report GCSECA has been able to successfully navigate this kind of “normal” in 2022.

The year started with the rebirth of our Annual Winter Meeting in Tempe. The Meeting had been on hiatus because of COVID but returned in full form. I was honored to be re-elected

Board President for another two-year term, which, per our Bylaws, will be my last. We also heard from a number of interesting speakers – including an insightful leadership panel that included the CEOs of our industry partners, CoBank, CFC and Federated, and the NRECA Board Chairman. We engaged with many legislative offices at the Capitol and hosted a well-attended dinner and reception at the Rustler’s Rooste.

We were able to usher two bills through the Arizona Legislature in 2022. One seemed like a “no-brainer,” and apparently it was, as it passed unanimously through the Legislature and quickly gained Gov. Doug Ducey’s signature. The bill does away with our co-ops being assessed twice to pay for regulatory oversight by the Arizona Corporation Commission. It will save our Members about \$300,000 each year.

The second bill removed outdated retail electric competition language from Arizona statutes. With the passage of this measure, Arizona's co-ops can rest assured that their Members will be spared schemes that purportedly will save them money through the "magic" of competitive electricity markets. We've seen that similar programs around the country have failed to live up to that promise.

We continued to be heavily engaged in congressional work, and several things emerged from Washington that will benefit our Members. One is equitable tax treatment for the development of renewable energy projects. The other is the creation of a mountain of grants that co-ops can tap into to help finance various parts of their operations, keeping costs down for Members.

At the Arizona Corporation Commission, (ACC) Co-ops held their own. The ACC finalized rules that allow co-ops to maintain flexibility in how they manage their disconnection programs and approved a finance application -

to allow Arizona G&T Cooperatives to build two gas units. Those generators will enable the G&T to continue to integrate renewable energy onto its system for its Members.

Our Summer Meeting in Flagstaff was a big hit - with record attendance and raising a record amount of money that benefits our political outreach and engagement efforts. One such engagement effort was the "Your Voice, Your Vote" campaign late in the year. The campaign focused on encouraging rural Arizona voters to make their voices heard on important races in the mid-term elections. We expect that effort to pay dividends down the road.

While we were successful in navigating "normal" in 2022, I am sure we will have more opportunities in 2023. I know GCSECA - led by my colleagues on our Board of Directors and our staff - will be up for the challenge.

We maintained a positive profile in Washington with our Congressional Delegation – gaining support on several critical measures that benefit co-ops. And we found ways to meaningfully connect with our Members at our Winter and Summer Meetings, through the Washington Youth Tour and expanded education and training offerings.

The few sentences that comprise the preceding paragraph belie the hard and excellent work the GCSECA Team put forth in 2022. Bills don't get passed at the Legislature unanimously, attendance and fundraising records don't get broken at meetings and positive results don't happen in the political arena by accident. I am very proud of our “small but mighty” GCSECA Team. And being small is an advantage, I think. It requires us to be agile, creative, and resourceful. We find and use leverage. 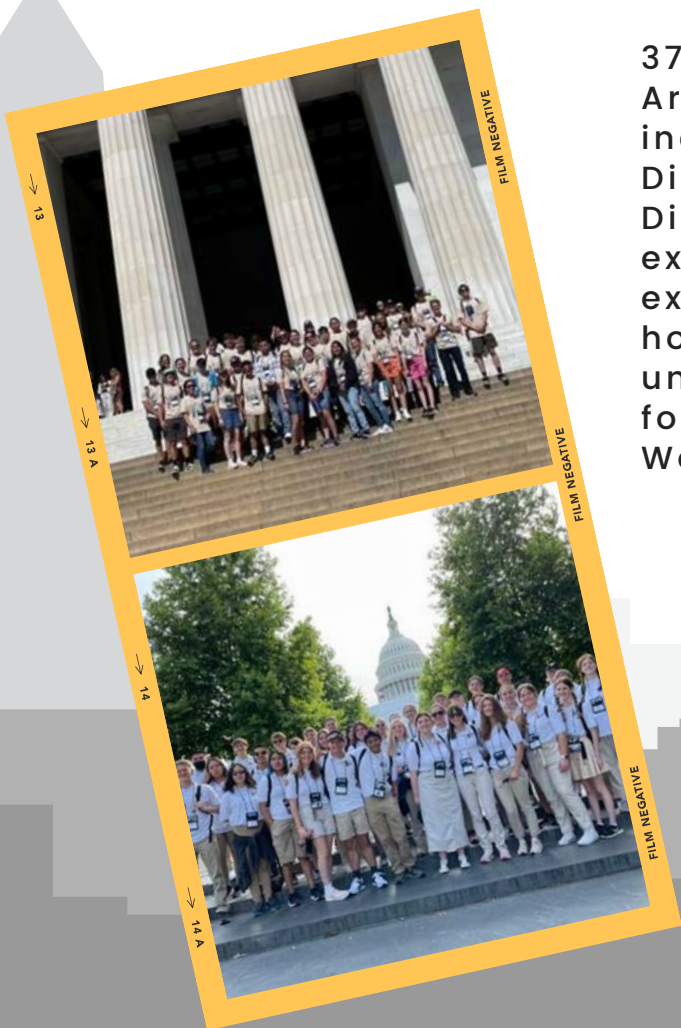
D.C. You Again!

The Week of a Lifetime – Washington Youth Tour

In 1957, future President Lyndon B. Johnson addressed the Annual Meeting of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA). He charged the membership with developing a program targeted at the youth of rural America. He declared, “if one thing comes out of this meeting, it will be sending youngsters to the National Capitol where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents.” In 1964, the NRECA founded the Washington Youth Tour. Starting out with just 400 students, it now changes the lives of over 1,900 students every year.

However, when unprecedented events impacted the global community with the COVID-19 pandemic, the Washington Youth Tour was postponed for both the 2020 and 2021 calendar years. After a 2-year hiatus, the Washington Youth Tour was back in June 2022 and still leaving a mark on students’ hearts and minds across the nation.

Youth Tour ignites a passion within delegates to look at the world with a fresh perspective, challenge the status quo, invest in rural America, and create change in their communities. Youth Tour is about elevating students to the next level, and it all happens in just one week.



37 students and 9 chaperones across Arizona attended the 2022 Youth Tour, including Hannah Capozzi as the Statewide Director, and Jorge Canaca as Assistant Director. Students and chaperones alike experienced a full schedule of events and experiences while in D.C., setting a tone of hope and adventure after two years of uncertainty and quarantine. GCSECA looks forward to participating with students in the Washington Youth Tour again in 2023.

In 2022, we continued to hold the line at the Corporation Commission and score wins federally. We forcefully advocated for continued exemptions from onerous rulemaking dockets under consideration at the ACC. Similarly, we closely worked with Arizona's Congressional Delegation to ensure Cooperative priorities were included in keystone energy and climate legislation. The results were fruitful, proving GCSECA continues to execute on behalf of its Members.

Arizona Corporation Commission

Early in the year, the Corporation Commission took a surprising vote to shelve the Revised Energy Rulemaking package until after the midterm elections and the two new commissioners are seated in January 2023. In its current form, the package seeks to extend the deadline for utilities to attain carbon-free emissions energy portfolios by 2070. GCSECA successfully included provisions codifying and enhancing the Commission's historic flexible application of Renewable Energy Standard and Tariff (REST) requirements and expressly exempting the distribution Cooperatives.

Likewise, the SAA docket relating to Integrated Resource Planning and All-Source Request For Proposals (IRP/ASRFP) associated with resource procurement was also deferred until January 2023. As with the Revised Energy Rules, GCSECA worked with ACC staff and commissioners to propose provisions limiting the obligations placed on the Cooperatives in the IRP/ASRFP rules package. If and when these dockets are revived, we are well positioned to mitigate regulatory impacts.

Competitive Community Solar

GCSECA also participated in a docket opened by the Chairwoman to establish a Commission policy for the development and integration of competitive community solar and storage projects in Arizona. This provided our Co-ops an opportunity to explain the many benefits and advantages of the Co-ops' not-for-profit business model. In this docket, GCSECA believes the best path forward is to preserve flexibility, allow each utility to develop and propose community solar programs tailored to its respective Members' needs and service territories, and evaluate those proposals on a case-by-case basis.



Incoming Commissioners

Republicans Nick Myers (pictured left) and Kevin Thompson (pictured right) were elected to the two open Arizona Corporation Commission seats and will serve four-year terms. With a 4-1 Republican majority, the new Commissioners have committed to returning the Commission to its core authorities of ratemaking and prescribing just and reasonable rates. Both have expressed strong opposition to mandates and subsidies.



Federal Legislative Matters

President Biden signed into law the Inflation Reduction Act (Act) of 2022, a spending package of Democratic priorities on energy, climate, and healthcare. The package included two key provisions specific to not-for-profit rural electric cooperatives. GCSECA communicated the importance of a public power-focused Comparable Energy Tax Incentives provision (Direct Pay) to the Arizona Congressional Delegation. GCSECA also fought to remove burdensome mandates and costly penalties from earlier iterations of the bill.

Direct Pay Tax Incentives

- Creates a “direct payment” option for cooperatives allowing tax parity with industry counterparts to deploy new energy technologies, including carbon capture, nuclear, energy storage, and traditional renewables.

USDA Financial Assistance for Clean Energy

- Creates a \$9.7 billion grant and loan program designed specifically for electric cooperatives that purchase or build new clean energy systems. All funding was provided to USDA in FY22 and is available to be spent until 2031.

Rural Energy for America Program

- Provides \$1.965 billion to the Rural Energy for America Program and \$1 billion for forgivable Section 317 loans for electric generation (from renewable energy resources) for resale to rural and non-rural residents.

Tier 2 Shortage Declared on the Colorado River

The Colorado River Basin is currently experiencing a severe and ongoing drought, affecting water supplies and hydropower generation. As Lake Mead's water level fell below 1,050 feet, the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) imposed water reductions in mid-



August 2022. The declaration triggered a loss of an additional **80,000 acre-feet** of water – **21%** less than its total share but only **3%** less than this year's allocation to Arizona.

This scenario threatens the viability of life-sustaining federal projects (Hoover Dam, Colorado River Storage Project, and Parker & Davis). GCSECA educated our Congressional Delegation on the potential impacts Colorado River Project customers will face, leading to unprecedented rate volatility, uncertainty, and eroding the benefits of recently signed long-term (40-50 year) power contracts. U.S. Democratic senators Kyrsten Sinema and Mark Kelly responded by introducing legislation to protect grid reliability and stabilize rates for our Member-Owners.



Federal Regulatory Actions:

SCOTUS Rejects EPA Ability to Set Fleet-Wide GHG Emissions Standards for Power Plants

Bringing an end to almost a decade-long regulatory battle, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled against the Obama administration's 2015 Climate Rule, widely known as the Clean Power Plan. The Rule attempted to push a wholesale shift away from coal and toward natural gas and renewable sources to reduce green house gas emissions. The SCOTUS determined the Rule was "unprecedented" and an unlawful expansion of Environmental Protection Agency power. The decision made it clear that EPA cannot set fleet-wide greenhouse gas emissions limits for existing power plants using a "generation shifting" approach under the Clean Air Act's Section 111(d). This provides much-needed certainty to an industry that has suffered from regulatory whiplash under the last three administrations.

ACC DOUBLE ASSESSMENT FIXED THROUGH LEGISLATION

On March 30th, Governor Ducey signed HB2232, a bill sponsored by Rep. Gail Griffin, into law. The legislation eliminated the double assessment on gross revenues derived from sales of electricity from the Arizona Generation and Transmission (G&T) Cooperatives to their distribution Cooperative Members. Because both the G&T and distribution Cooperatives were paying an assessment, that means that prior to passage, members of an electric co-op were paying two assessments on the same electron.

After a 59-0 vote in the House in February, the bill picked up serious momentum. In early March, HB2232 sailed through the Senate Natural Resources, Energy & Water Committee with a 9-0 vote.

Soon after, we became aware that the bill was labeled a “money bill,” which means that it was thought that it could cost the state money if implemented. Of course, by virtue of the statute the bill is amending, it was revenue neutral since it does not impact the appropriation authority the Corporation Commission is granted.

After working with legislators and staff in both the House and Senate and members of the Governor’s Budget Team, we were able to ensure the legislation’s removal from the list and onward the bill progressed. After solving this, we proceeded in the Senate where it was ultimately voted out of its chamber with a 27-0 vote.

On August 9th, the Co-ops along with several of our legislative allies, participated in a ceremonial signing of HB2232 with Governor Ducey. Representing the Co-ops were Jeff Larson, GCSECA Board President, Rich Tempelman, Mohave Electric Cooperative Board Treasurer, Casey Ratlief, Director of State Government Relations as well as Russell Smoldon of B3 Strategies.

The legislative allies in attendance were Rep. Gail Griffin, Rep. Regina Cobb, Rep. Lupe Diaz, Sen. Sonny Borrelli, and Sen. Sine Kerr. All of our legislative allies were helpful in carrying the message to their colleagues that the issue of double assessing the co-ops on electricity sold to other co-ops within the state was in dire need of a solution.

ELECTRIC COMPETITION STATUTES REPEALED

Almost 25 years after being passed into law, the statutes that allow for electric competition in Arizona have been repealed. The path to pass HB2101, another Rep. Griffin bill, was arduous, however. The bill passed, 10-2, out of the Natural Resources, Energy and Water Committee in the House in January after being amended to satisfy the Democratic members of the committee. From there it was a long slog, with the bill being voted down multiple times.

The process included lengthy debates in Committee, Caucus and on the House and Senate floors. Also included were floor votes, where HB2101 failed to receive the votes necessary to pass; prompting motions to reconsider the legislation in the subsequent days. Finally, on April 19th, the bill went to the Senate floor for the final time and passed with a 17-12 vote. HB2101 was signed by Governor Ducey on April 26th.





This year the Grand Canyon State Electric Cooperative Association managed the most robust get-out-the-vote program in Arizona co-op history. The effort was named “Your Voice, Your Vote.” We worked with co-ops throughout Arizona to encourage members to vote in the election and to vote the entire ballot, most importantly in the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC) race. In doing research, we found that voters routinely “under-voted” in the ACC contest. This means that many voters may cast a ballot and vote at the top of the ballot, but skip the ACC election.

We worked hard to ensure that co-op members knew the importance of voting in the ACC race. We worked with many vendors to get our message out, which included information on key issues, the candidates as well as information on how and where to vote.

The “Your Voice, Your Vote” effort was a rousing success, with nearly 15 million impressions and almost 30,000 click-throughs onto our website, www.RuralArizonaVotes.com. We believe that we made the maximum impact. Most importantly, we saw a marked increase in the number of votes on the ACC race in the counties that we serve and a lower number of “undervotes.”

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MEMBER & PUBLIC RELATIONS

Coming out of the COVID-19 pandemic, the GCSECA Communications department has made great strides to continue our accurate and timely communications to our Members and staff. In 2022, we worked diligently to communicate the Co-op story, utilizing all media channels, as well as advocating and engaging our Arizona Co-op voters in the midterm election.

The Manager of Member and Public Relations provides several services for the Statewide designed to assist the Member organizations in their education, professional development, communications, and public outreach efforts. The COVID-19 pandemic highlighted the adaptivity of GCSECA's communications and set a new standard for Member & public engagement. In 2022, GCSECA maintained the new steady pace while incorporating new practices. Outlined below are the highlighted successes from 2022:

HIGHLIGHTS

- Continued the transition of training and professional development courses through the Learning Management System (LMS), ExpertusOne, as part of GCSECA's Education and Professional Development Program.
- Incorporated the Supervisor and Management Development Program (SMDP) into GCSECA's Education and Professional Development statewide program.
- Continued the timely development and distribution of GCSECA's monthly editions of the electronic newsletter, Current Activities.
- Continued the quarterly publication of the GCSECA Currents magazine, which is directed toward key leaders within the electric utility industry.
- Successfully transitioned the Currents magazine with Pioneer Utility Resources (PUR) for a more robust publication with 6 bimonthly editions expected in 2023.
- Planned, coordinated, and assisted in the 2022 GCSECA Summer Meeting and 22nd Annual Miles Oldfather Golf Tournament at the Little America Hotel in Flagstaff, AZ.



- Secured numerous sponsorships for both the 2022 Annual Winter Meeting and the 2022 Summer Meeting, resulting in an average revenue of \$33,500 in sponsored funds.
- Managed and created the GCSECA 2023 printed Directory of Member Systems and Affiliate Organizations.
- Planned, organized, and directed the 2022 Washington Youth Tour; the first National Youth Tour event since 2019.
- Served as Staff Liaison to the Education and Professional Development committee, the Group Purchasing Committee, and the Member & Public Relations Committee.
- Continued content planning and coordination with Pioneer Utility Resources to increase the engagement, frequency and quality of content posted to GCSECA social media pages and sites.
- Developed, designed, and coordinated with the creation and execution of the Your Vote, Your Voice Co-ops vote initiative for the Arizona midterm election and ACC race.
- Increased public and member relations with the Communications staff at NRECA to further highlight Arizona's co-op success.
- Coordinated and hosted quarterly meetings with the Member & Public Relations Committee, Education & Professional Development Committee, and the Group Purchasing Committee.
- Coordinated the content, design, and publication of GCSECA's Annual Report and ACRE Annual Report.
- Created, edited and unveiled the 2021 End of Year video at the 2022 Annual Winter Meeting.
- Analyzed and developed a new 2023 Communications Plan which highlights key improvement areas found in the National Survey on the Cooperative Difference.

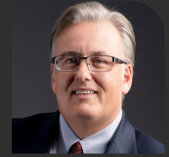

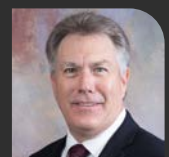
